Stevens County Happenings

The County Commissioners approved a balanced budget on December 29, 2009

The approved **Current Expense Budget** has a built in safety net of \$189,000. This is calculated by comparing Expected Revenues (\$14,580,000) with Estimated Expenditures (\$14,391,000). This \$189,000 safety net will help prepare for expiring **State and Federal Grants** in 2011. The Total County Estimated Expenditures for all funds is \$55,495,000.

Wages and benefits are always a big portion of the Current Expense budget because it is a service/people driven budget. The Commissioners deal with five different bargaining groups within Current Expense and two more in two other funds. The present contracts run through 2010 and had language defining annual cost-of-living increases. In 2010 that increase is 2% for the Courthouse, Prosecutor, and Sheriff Support Staff and 3% for the Sheriff Commissioned Officers and Correction Officers. The Commissioners asked for reconsideration by the groups and those talks are continuing at this time.

Those not in a union group within Current Expense, essentially Elected Officials, Department Heads, Deputy Prosecutors, Sheriff Appointees, Commissioners, CASA staff received no cost-of-living for the second straight year.

Seven positions in the Sheriff's Office previously County funded are now funded by a State and Federal Grant that will not be there in 2012. This was done to maintain the minimum staffing currently in the Sheriff Office. The Commissioners could not see reducing those positions because of the concern for public safety and the officer's safety.

At this point, the Commissioners are moving ahead with a two-day per month furlough plan to help insure that their budget objectives are met. This will cause some changes in office hours to the public. Those changes are as follows;

Auditor Vehicle Licensing will be closed the 2nd and 3rd Mondays of each month beginning January 11th.

Auditor Recording Desk will be closed from Noon to 1pm when only one staff person is available

Land Services (Building and Planning) will be closed the 2nd and 4th Fridays

Treasurer's Office will be closed on the 2nd Monday and open from 9am to Noon on the third 3rd Monday..

District Court will be open at 8:30 am on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday and at 9am on Thursday and Friday. They will be closed from 12:00pm to 1:00pm each day and close for the day at 3:30pm.

Licensing Office at Suncrest will not be affected by schedule changes.

Joint Powers Resolution

Stevens County Commissioners are working on a resolution to force federal agencies to coordinate with local governments before taking action on projects or proposals. They do things on occasion that impact a county economically that the county has no control over or even input. The resolution would also include any state agencies that receive federal funds. Several counties in Eastern Washington are working on very similar resolutions.

You will find a copy of the resolution on the county website.

Drug Alcohol Counseling Advisory Vote

If you recall I mentioned some months ago that the drug alcohol counseling money from the state was being cut severely. We had a hearing at Lakeside Middle School to discuss the possibility of imposing a one tenth of one percent increase in sales tax to fill the gap. I later mentioned the Board of County Commissioners voted to **not** impose the tax increase but rather to place the issue on an ADVISORY BALLOT. The Board of Commissioners will use the information from the advisory ballot to decide whether or not to impose the increase in sales tax. The commissioners on December---voted to place the issue on the February 9th ballot. If the change is made it would increase our sales tax from 7.6% to 7.7%.

Washington State 2010-2030 Freight Rail Plan identifies statewide freight rail needs

OLYMPIA – The Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) has completed the Washington State 2010-2030 Freight Rail Plan as directed by the Washington State Legislature. This plan is a revision to the Washington State Freight Rail Plan 1998 Update.

The plan is available on-line at: www.wsdot.wa.gov/Freight/Rail/Plan.

The Freight Rail Plan will provide guidance for rail initiatives and investments in Washington State over the next 20 years that will:

- Support Washington's economic competitiveness and economic viability.
- Preserve the ability of Washington's freight rail system to efficiently serve the needs of its customers.
- Facilitate freight system capacity increases to improve mobility and reduce congestion.

Take advantage of freight rail's modal energy efficiency to reduce the negative environmental impact of freight movement in Washington.

"The Freight Rail Plan is an important part of ensuring Washington's freight rail system remains an efficient and economically viable system, since a large part of our economy depends on freight for its competitiveness and growth," said Paula Hammond, Secretary of Transportation.

Washington's freight rail system carried 116 million tons of freight in 2007 (most recent data available). Freight rail employed 4,207 people in the state and contributed \$533 million directly to the state's gross domestic product.

The Washington State Freight Rail Plan complies with the Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) requirements that the state establishes, updates, and revises a rail plan in order to receive federal assistance. The Freight Rail Plan also fulfills state requirements, under the Revised Code of Washington (RCW) 47.76.220 and RCW 47.06.080, that WSDOT prepare and periodically revise a state rail plan that identifies, evaluates, and encourages essential rail services.

"This plan is the product of six months of research and development, but ultimately continues the research and planning that has been done since 1978," said Scott Witt, State Rail and Marine Director. "The strategies and recommendations identified within the plan will help guide us in determining the most effective and responsible improvements and investments necessary to our rail system."

In the development of the Washington State Freight Rail Plan, an advisory committee was formed involving stakeholders from rail industries, ports, shippers, local entities, tribes, transportation communities, interest groups, and the general public. The advisory committee's role was to help WSDOT assess and evaluate the freight rail system, capacity, and needs assessment, understand concerns of local communities, share information, and provide feedback during the development process.

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Commissioner Goldmark announces pilot projects in Biomass Initiative. Four firms selected to turn woody biomass into clean energy and jobs

OLYMPIA – Commissioner of Public Lands Peter Goldmark today announced the first four companies selected to partner with the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) in renewable energy projects using biomass from state forestlands.

"These four partners will put their technologies to work using forest products they purchase from state trust lands to produce clean, sustainable energy and rural jobs," said Goldmark. "These projects have a huge potential to help encourage rural economic development and improve the health of fire-prone forests. This will hopefully be the beginning of a new green industry on state lands."

The pilot projects will use woody biomass—the residual waste (slash)—that the companies purchase in part from state trust lands managed by DNR. The biomass can come from timber harvests or be removed during forest health treatments such as thinning over-crowded and fire-prone tree stands.

The pilot projects and their locations are:

- Parametrix will launch a pilot to convert woody biomass into liquid fuels at SDS Lumber in Bingen (Klickitat County) using fast pyrolysis technology.
- Borgford BioEnergy, LLC in Valley and Springdale (Stevens County) will utilize wood waste to generate electricity, bio-oil, syngas, and bio-char.
- Atlas Products in Omak (Okanogan County) will use forest biomass to produce wood pellets for heating.
- Nippon Paper Industries USA, Ltd. in Port Angeles (Clallam County) will utilize wood waste for the co-generation of heat and electricity at its paper mill, as well as selling excess energy.

Commenting today on the projects were representatives from the four companies:

"The partnership with DNR helps show that this is a very viable operation that will help us as we seek funding from private investors," said Ken Fellows of Parametrix. "This partnership will help us advance to the next level by highlighting the credibility of our team and our project."

"Jobs have to be sustainable and we have to use good stewardship in the forestland. We're really excited about being a partner with DNR because this project does both," said Dale Borford, Borford BioEnergy, LLC.

"This project is not only creating new jobs, but actually saving the jobs and infrastructure that already exist. It represents the very best of what can happen with forest restoration and bio-mass energy production," said Eric Hanson of Atlas Products.

"The relationship with DNR will help us secure volume, quality of supply of biomass to our plant in Port Angeles and help preserve the 220 jobs there now," said Harold Norlund, Nippon Paper Industries USA.

New Biomass Legislation

Today's announcement came in the same week that House and Senate committees in the Washington Legislature were conducting hearings on the Forest Biomass Supply Agreements Bill requested by Goldmark.

"The selection of these projects is an important step in moving forward with a new, green energy industry, and I'm thrilled that Port Angeles' own Nippon was chosen to participate," said state Rep. Kevin Van De Wege, D- Sequim. "One way to create stable, family-wage jobs in this emerging industry is to allow the state to enter into long-term biomass supply contracts with businesses. A bill I'm sponsoring in the House would do this, paving the way for energy-related timber jobs in our rural communities."

The bill (SB 6236 / HB 2481) would allow DNR to enter into long-term biomass supply agreements with the emerging biomass energy economy. The ability to secure reliable and predictably priced biomass feedstock supply is central to triggering private investment in the emerging biomass energy economy.

Neither the requested legislation nor the projects announced today would have any cost to the State's General Fund, and they may lead to new markets and revenue for forest products.

Biomass Initiative

In 2009, HB 2165 was enacted into law authorizing DNR to implement biomass energy pilot projects in eastern and western Washington.

Removing biomass feedstock in ecologically sustainable ways to produce energy (liquid fuels or heat and electricity) can:

- Provide income for forest landowners while improving forest health;
- Create rural jobs;
- Reduce wildfires and greenhouse gas emissions; and
- Aid in the production of renewable energy.

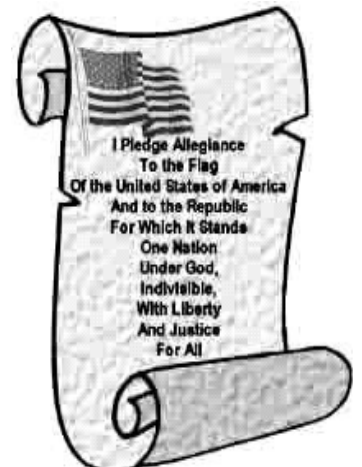
